

First of all, I wish to express my gratitude to Barbara Carder and the Hall of Fame Committee for seeing worth in my handling of life as it happened to me. I am proud, excited and humble all at the same time at this honor they have chosen to bestow on me.

Much of how I dealt with my life had to do with my parents. I lived in a home that was free of strife and loaded with love, books and wisdom. My parents did not have the privilege of a high school education. They taught themselves and persevered through life's troubles with honor. At one bad time in my life, my mother's advice was very simple—"OK, they've knocked you down and stepped on you, now get up, put your chin up and GO!" I took her words very seriously. I think it's probably how I managed to get here tonight!

The real beginning of the exciting part of my trip through life began when I hit Kodak's glass ceiling. It meant that I had no opportunity to grow and I had this enormous need to do SOMETHING, something significant. I entertained the ridiculous thought of becoming a nurse, took the plunge and applied. Highland Hospital took a chance on their very first "older" student, and so it all began—and at the age of 35 I became an RN.

As I learned more, I realized I never knew quite enough, so I kept searching for more knowledge. It took me to the U of R to become a Nurse Practitioner; a tour on the Ship Hope to live and work in a foreign country and culture; and on to Empire State College to earn my BS degree. After many long years of different work experiences, I finally ended up back in my hometown as historian, another entirely new learning experience. I cannot possibly know what is coming next. The search is endless.

In this process of searching, I met some spectacularly wonderful people who inspired and helped me through both great and tough times. And true to my parents' teachings, I always got up, put my chin up and met the world head on. I persevered, but probably not always with wisdom, being of the species "human being".

So, I am wondering where all those years went, and feeling a Wonderment at being so honored for just trying to learn enough.

Managing Pet Waste to Prevent Contamination of Drinking Water

Did you know that it is a violation of Village Sanitary Ordinances not to pick up and dispose of your pets waste?

The most effective way for pet owners to limit their pet's contribution to source water contamination is to simply clean up and dispose of pet waste. As long as the droppings are not mixed with other materials, pet waste should be flushed down the toilet, this allows waste to be properly treated by community sewage system. Also, pet waste can be buried or sealed in a plastic bag and put in the garbage.

Affordable Housing Community for Senior Citizens opens in Hilton -SPRING 2007

Unity Health System Accepting Applications for Hilton Park

Unity Health Systems has announced that applications are being accepted for Hilton Park Senior Apartments. The complex, located in the Village is an affordable senior housing community funded by the NYS Housing Trust Fund. Eligibility is based on Federal government guidelines of age and income:

- Head of household must be 55 years of age or older
- Maximum gross income for one person household cannot exceed \$22,450
- Maximum gross income for a two person household cannot exceed \$25,650

One and two bedroom apartments are available. Security and fire systems, on-site laundry, a community room and lounge are among the benefits to tenants. In addition, Hilton Park residents will have access to all services provided by Unity Health System, including home health care and skilled nursing care.

Tenants will be chosen by lottery from the pool of eligible applicants. Hilton Park is an equal opportunity housing development. Applications are available to all interested without regard to religion, race, color, sex national origin or disability. For more information, call 368-4201.
